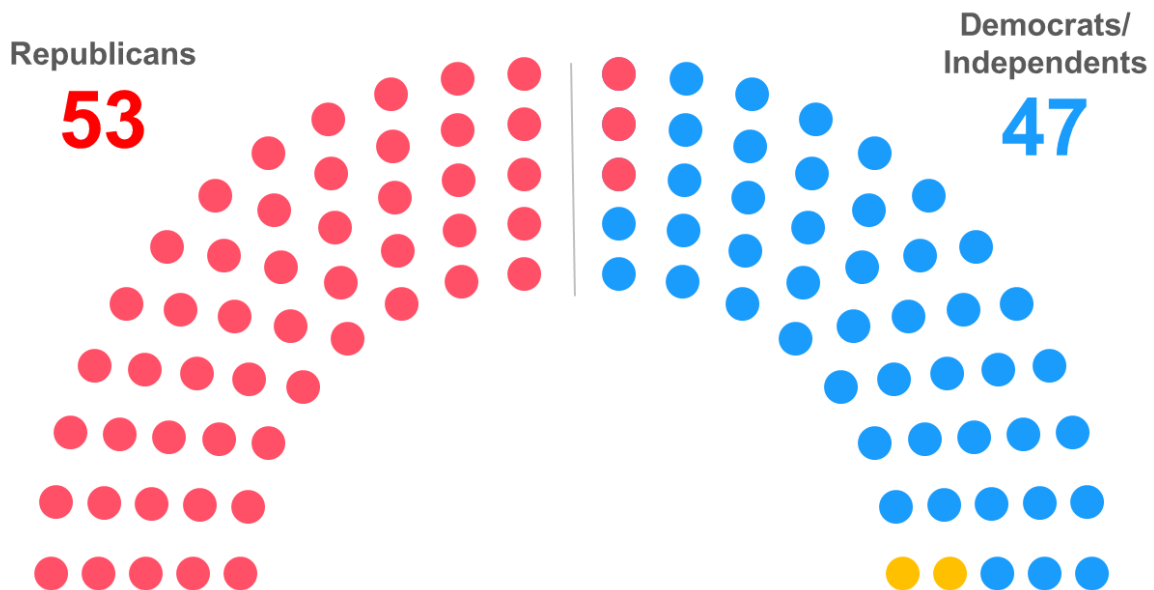

Senate Balance of Power

Following the 2024 general election, Republicans have taken back control of the United States Senate with a 53-47 seat majority. Republicans flipped seats in Ohio, West Virginia, Montana, and Pennsylvania. Two Independent Senators remain in the chamber, including Angus King (I-ME) and Bernie Sanders (I-VT), both of which plan to continue caucusing with Senate Democrats. Sen. John Thune (R-SD) was elected by the Republican Conference to serve as the next Majority Leader, succeeding Sen. Mitch McConnell (R-KY), who stepped down from leadership after serving a record-long 18 years as the Republican leader in the chamber. Senator John Barrasso, MD (R-WY), an orthopaedic surgeon, was elected to serve in the #2 Republican Senate leadership role. With Republicans retaking the White House, Vice President J.D. Vance will serve as the President of the Senate, casting any tie-breaking votes in the case of any 50-50 split on the floor. Senator Chuck Schumer (D-NY) will continue to hold the Democratic leadership position.

The Senate committees with primary jurisdiction in health issues are the Senate Finance Committee (Medicare, Medicaid, Affordable Care Act) and the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee (FDA, NIH, CDC, public health, Affordable Care Act).

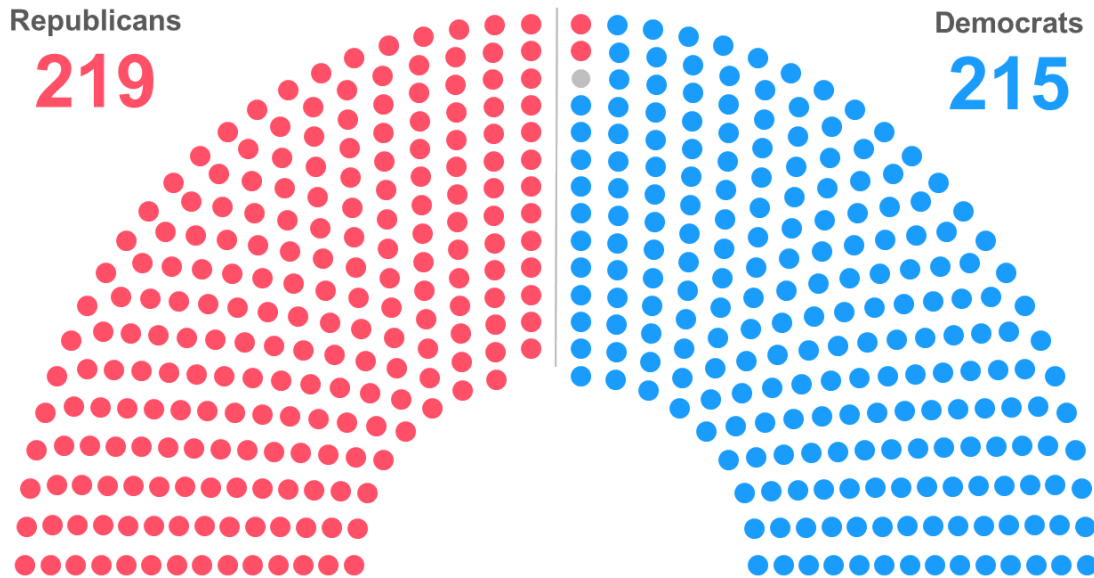

House Balance of Power

Republicans continue to hold a narrow majority in the House of Representatives, with Democrats netting a 2-seat gain during the 2024 general election. House Speaker Mike Johnson has been nominated to continue in his position in the 119th Congress, with a final vote coming in front of the full House in January.

House Leadership

With Republicans retaining power in the House of Representatives, Speaker Mike Johnson has been nominated to continue serving as the head of his party in the chamber. A formal vote on the position will be put before the full House in January. Some movement has occurred in the Republican Conference leadership, with new names at Republican Conference Chair, Policy Committee Chair, and Conference Secretary. House Democrats will remain in the minority, with a continuing of leadership by Hakeem Jeffries of New York and his team from the previous congress, with the addition of Maxwell Frost to the Democratic Policy and Communications Committee leadership. Frost will serve as the first Gen-Z congressional leader from either political party.

Sen. Angela Alsobrooks (D-MD)



A lifelong Marylander, Angela was born and raised in Prince George's County. After graduating from Duke University and the University of Maryland School of Law, she worked as a law clerk in the Howard County Circuit Court, and later the Baltimore City Circuit Court, before becoming the first full-time Assistant State's Attorney to handle domestic violence cases in Prince George's County. Angela held a variety of roles in county government before making history as the youngest and first woman to be elected Prince George's County State's Attorney. In 2018, Angela was elected Prince George's County Executive, the first woman to hold the position and the first Black woman elected to the office of County Executive in Maryland history. Angela has one daughter and is

Sen. Jim Banks (R-IN)



Jim Banks was elected to U.S. House of Representatives in 2016 representing Indiana's 3rd Congressional District. Sen. Rubén Gallego (D-AZ)



Ruben Gallego represented the 3rd District of Arizona in the U.S. House of Representatives. He was first elected in 2014. He was the first in his family to attend college, graduating from Harvard University with a Bachelor of Arts in international relations. Following his experience in Iraq, Congressman Gallego committed to ensuring that servicemen and –women are never sent into harm’s way without a plan for winning the fight and securing their wellbeing while deployed and back in the

United States. Ruben was elected to the Arizona House of Representatives in 2010 and served until 2014. In 2010, Gallego married Kate Widland Gallego, who was later elected mayor of Phoenix. Sen. Jon Husted (R-OH)



Jon Allen Husted (born August 25, 1967) is an American politician who has served as the 66th Lieutenant Governor of Ohio since 2019. A member of the Republican Party, Husted was previously the 50th Ohio Secretary of State from 2011 to 2019. Husted previously represented the 6th District of the Ohio Senate (a portion of Montgomery County) from 2009 to 2011 and was a member of the Ohio House of Representatives from 2001 to 2009. From 2005 to 2009, Husted served as Speaker of the Ohio House of Representatives and remains the 7th youngest person to ever become Ohio House Speaker. He was elected Ohio Secretary of State in 2010 and re-elected in 2014. Husted was born in the Detroit area in 1967 and was immediately placed for adoption. He has stated that

his biological father did not want him and his biological mother was unable to care for him. He was adopted by Jim and Judy Husted and raised in the Northwest Ohio Community of Montpelier, Ohio as the oldest of three children. Husted graduated from Montpelier High School in 1985. He later received both a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Dayton. In January 2025, Gov. Mike DeWine selected his own Lt. Gov. Jon Husted to become the next senator from Ohio. As both a successful business owner and the Governor of West Virginia, Jim Justice possesses a deep understanding of job creation and economic growth. His expertise in these areas enables him to effectively foster a business-friendly environment, attract investments, and create opportunities that drive prosperity for the state and its residents. He worked as a career public servant under both Democrats and Republicans, having served at USAID, the Pentagon, the State Department, the White House National Security Council, and in Afghanistan as an advisor to Generals Petraeus and Allen. Kim served on the House Armed Services Committee, House Foreign Affairs Committee, and House Select Committee on Strategic Competition between the United States and the Chinese Communist Party. Sen. David McCormick (R-PA)



Dave is a 7th generation Pennsylvanian. He's a West Point graduate, combat veteran and Bronze star recipient. He's a Pennsylvania job creator and a business leader. He's a national security expert and a strong and experienced voice for how to overcome the threat from China. Dave was born in Washington, Pennsylvania, and raised in Bloomsburg. The son of two lifelong teachers and prominent educators and the oldest of two boys. Growing up, Dave played football and wrestled, trimmed Christmas trees, delivered newspapers, and bused tables at the Magee Hotel. Dave was nominated to the United States Military Academy by a Pennsylvania Senator, and became the first kid from Bloomsburg to attend West Point in decades. After graduating, Dave went on to serve in the 82nd Airborne Division as a paratrooper. He was deployed to the Middle East during the First Gulf War and received the Bronze Star for his service in Iraq before retiring as a Captain. After the Army, Dave earned his Ph.D. in international relations from Princeton University before moving to Pittsburgh to start

a career in business. In 2005, Dave was called to service again, this time in the highest levels of government, including as Under Secretary of Treasury and as Deputy National Security Advisor. For four years, Dave spearheaded the fight to protect American technology from Chinese theft, advised the President on key national security issues, and helped negotiate the global response to the 2008 financial crisis. In 2019, Dave married Dina Powell, an executive at Goldman Sachs who was Deputy National Security Advisor in the Trump administration. Until 2015 he was married to Amy Richardson, with whom he has four children. He also has two stepdaughters from his marriage to Powell. Source: Bloomberg Government

Sen. Ashley Moody (R-FL)



Ashley Moody is an American attorney and politician who has served as the 38th attorney general of Florida since January 2019. Moody previously served as an assistant U.S. attorney and a circuit court judge in Hillsborough County. Moody graduated from Plant City High School in 1993. She received a bachelor's degree and master's degree in accounting from University of Florida. While attending the University of Florida, she served as president of Florida Blue Key. Moody earned a Master of Laws in international law from Stetson University College of Law, and her Juris Doctor from the University of Florida School of Law. During her tenure as Florida attorney general, Moody has supported lawsuits to invalidate the Affordable Care Act, advocated against restoration of voting rights for former felons, and opposed the legalization of recreational marijuana. Moody was a significant supporter of then-President Donald Trump in Florida during the 2020 presidential election, and joined in the Texas v. Pennsylvania lawsuit, which sought to contest the results of the election. In January 2025, Governor Ron DeSantis selected Moody to succeed Senator Marco Rubio pending his confirmation to become United States Secretary of State. 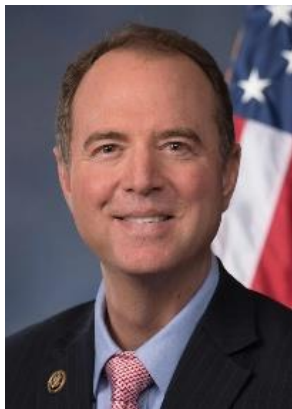
Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE)

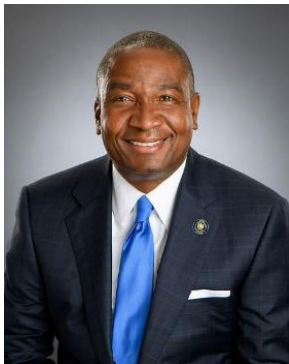

Rep. Shomari Figures (D-AL-02)



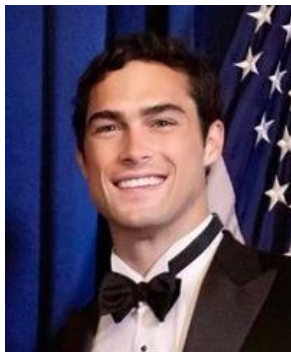

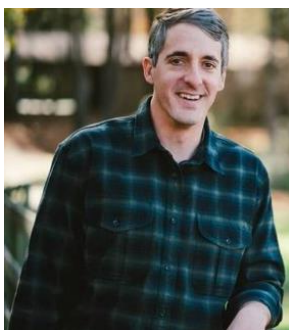
Rep. Kimberlyn King-Hinds (R-MP-At-Large)

Rep. David Taylor (R-OH-02)



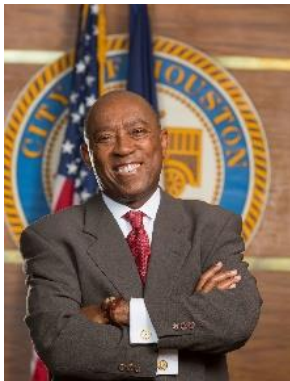

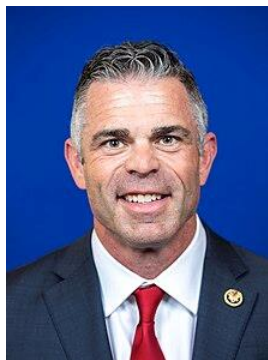
